# Have your say on county council's budget plans Melton Times

Residents in the Melton borough are being asked for their views on Leicestershire County Council's proposed budget, which includes a five per cent rise in the authority's share of local Council Tax bills.



### Headlines

- Revenue budget £504m in 2023/24
- Based on Council Tax increase of 5% in 2023/24 (3% core and 2% Adult Social care)
  - Equates to £1.39 per week increase for Band D home
  - Raises £18m more for LCC services every year
- Four-year MTFS includes:
  - £57m more to support vulnerable people (children's and adult social care)
  - £80m for inflationary pressures
  - £34m of efficiency savings + £25m of special educational needs and disability savings
  - £4m of service reductions
  - Assumption of 2% council tax in later years
- Estimated 250 reduction in posts (redundancies will be much less as scope to mitigate through turnover/redeployment)



Capital programme - £508m over four years for roads, schools and other projects

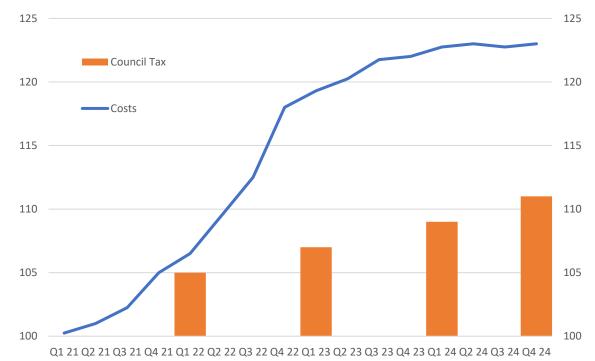
### Inflation impact

#### **Bank of England inflation forecasts**



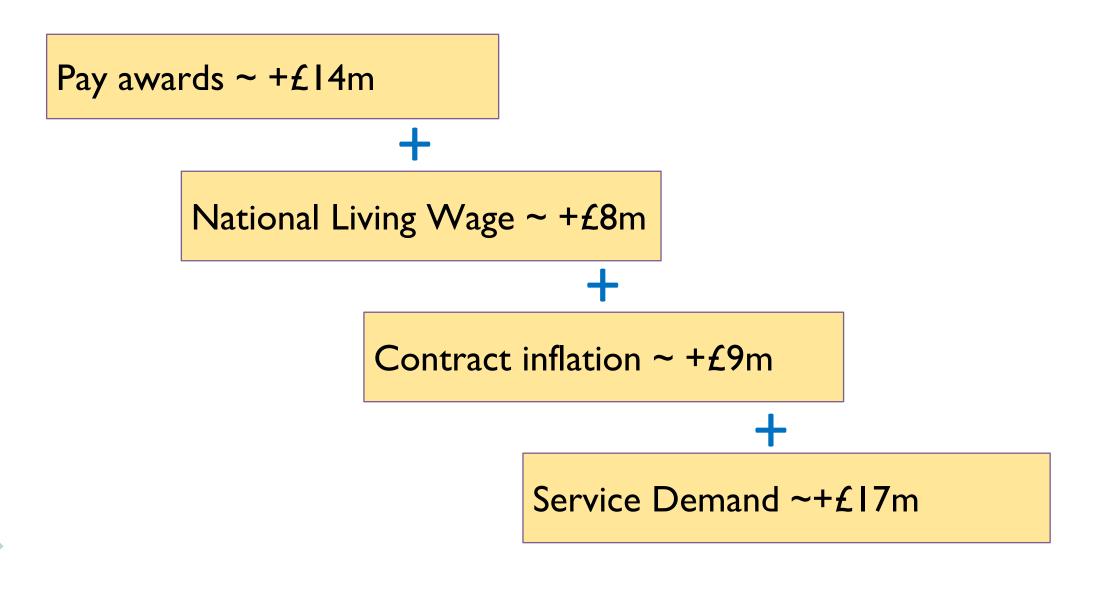
Expected to fall sharply – potentially negative before stabilising at 2% target from 2027

### Financial gap – how changed since last year

Savings incorporated into plans	19	36	50	63
Total Challenge	19	53	104	155
Challenge with maximum council tax (4.99% per year)		<mark>42</mark>	<mark>81</mark>	<mark>120</mark>

- Already saved £250m since 2010
- Need to find another £155m in just four years
- Maximising Council Tax still leaves £120m gap
- Further Government support? Unlikely to be significant
- More savings required

### Savings

£ millions	2023/24	2024/25	2025/26	2026/27
Efficiency savings (including High Needs)	17.7	32.3	45.3	58.6
Service reductions	1.2	3.6	4.2	4.2
Total savings	18.9	35.9	49.5	62.8
Service reduction (% of total)				7%

- Service reduction £1.2m in 23/24 rising to £4.2m by 26/27
- 7% of savings total (some will be mixed with efficiency or income)
- Will be subject to public consultation and impact assessments
- Main areas:
  - Shire Grants
  - Recycling and household waste site provision
  - Park and ride
  - Street lighting
  - Bus subsidy
  - Homelessness support
  - Health improvement services

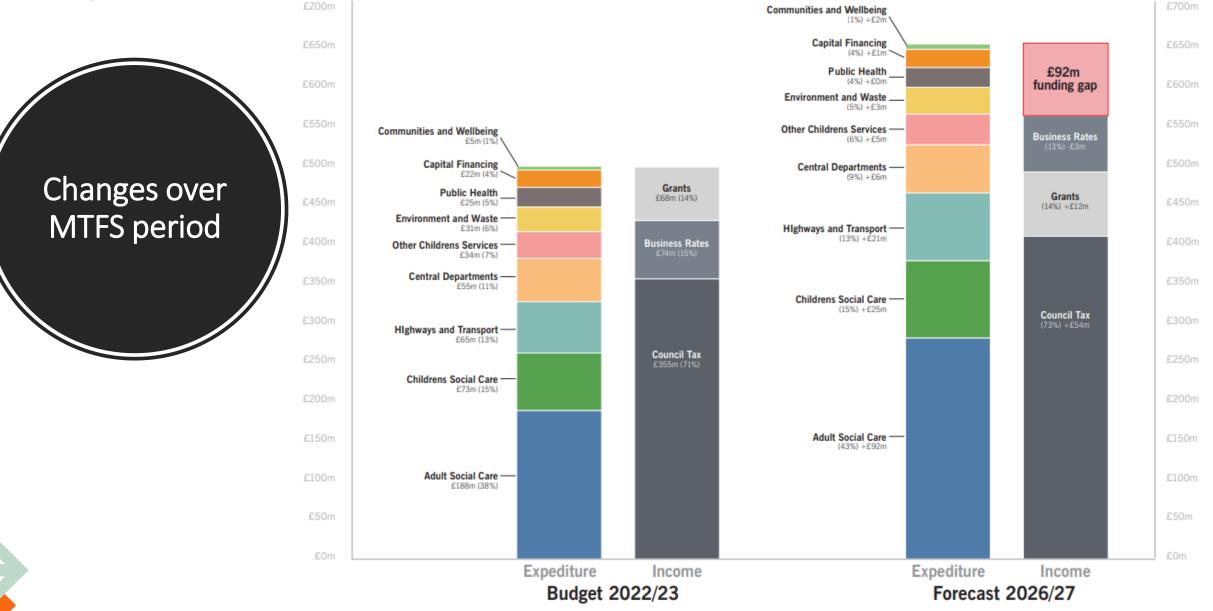


#### **Criteria for Member decision making on service reductions**

- Statutory or discretionary provision or service
- National or local access criteria
- Impact on vulnerable individuals and communities/EDI impacts
- Consultation feedback
- Scale of potential saving
- Ease of implementation/delivery timescales
- Political pledges/commitment to implement
- Impact on Strategic Plan priorities
- Reputational risks



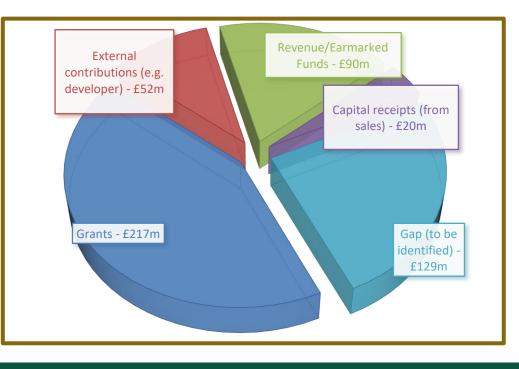

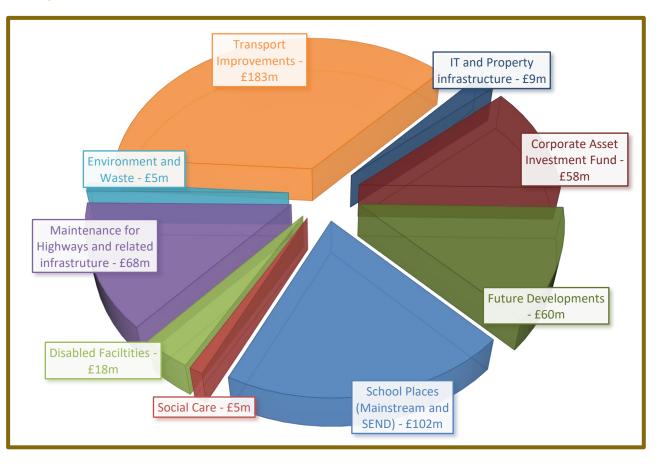

### **Uncertainties**

- Local government settlement
- Detailed information for 23/24 only general economic picture to estimate later years impact
- Some specific grant allocations still unknown for 23/24
- Inflation under control?
- Adult social care reform and funding (new parliament)
- Fair cost of care assumptions in advance of reform
- Fair funding no benefit assumed
- Pay awards
- Recession impact on Council Tax base and collection
- Other reforms

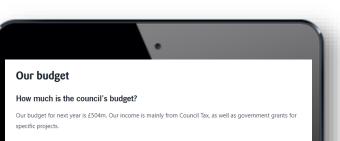

#### What period do your budget proposals cover?

We publish a four-year budget plan every year, known as the medium term financial strategy. It includes areas where investment is planned to meet increased demand – known as growth – and areas earmarked for savings.

#### How much is spent on different services?

The chart breaks down spend and income over the next four years. The financial outlook remains extremely tough with our budget gap set to rise to over £90m by 2026.

#### What are the proposals?

At a glance

- £57m more to support vulnerable people to pay for more home and residential care, and support
  people with physical disabilities, learning disabilities and mental health needs. The number of home care
  users has increased by 600 since January 2020.
- £59m of efficiency savings reducing back office costs by maximising digital technology, simplifying processes and providing the right level of support to residents
- Service cuts totalling £4m including reviewing waste sites, streetlighting, Green Plaques and Shire Grants
- A five per cent Council Tax rise for 2023/24 this equates to £1.39 a week for a Band D home and generates £17.7m for front line services
- £508m four-year capital pot for the cost of building roads, schools and other one-off projects
